



## Guidelines for Publication Lists

- The University of Zurich is one of the signatories of the San Francisco Declaration on Research Assessment (**DORA Declaration**; <https://sfdora.org/>). The key recommendation of this declaration is: "Do not use journal-based metrics, such as Journal Impact Factors, as a surrogate measure of the quality of individual research articles, to assess an individual scientist's contributions, or in hiring, promotion, or funding decisions."

### Instructions:

- Your publication list must be **up-to-date and dated**.
  - Your name must be clearly identifiable in all listed publications (e.g. in **bold** or *underlined*).
  - **First and last authorships** must be clearly indicated.
  - The **citation format** must follow international standards and correspond to the example below.  
Please note:
    - list all authors
    - state the title of the work
    - provide the journal title using the abbreviation of the National Library of Medicine (NLM)
    - indicate the year of publication and volume of the journal as well as the first and last page numbers of the article (if available)
  - **Papers accepted for publication** may be listed provided that the letter of acceptance is attached.
  - Manuscripts that have been **submitted** or are **in preparation** must not be listed.
  - Authorship in a **collaborative paper** does not count.
  - Please provide the **PubMed link or DOI** for each publication.
  - Your publication list must not include **impact factors** (see above).
- Please name **your (max.) 5 most important publications from the last 10 years** and describe their significance and your own contribution in a maximum of 100 words each. You may also name and describe 5 additional publications from earlier years. Additionally, you may list up to **5 other important scientific contributions**, such as patents, prototypes, software, and outreach activities, and describe each of these in a maximum of 100 words.

## The publications must be numbered, arranged in chronological order (most recent first), and grouped according to the following categories:

### 1. Original Articles

An original article is defined as a scientific publication presenting original, new data that has been published in a journal following evaluation by independent reviewers ("peer review"). With few exceptions, the journal is indexed in the Citation Index. Please note that meta-analyses are considered original articles, whereas case reports (see section 3), study protocols, or Letters to the Editor (see section 6) are not. Publications produced within the framework of consortia are considered original articles only if you were a member of the writing committee.

Please indicate first and last name, title of the thesis, year of completion, and whether you supervised or co-supervised the thesis.

7. **Articles Published in Special Issues and Supplements** (e.g. page numbers marked with “S”, such as 24S–28S)
8. **Letters, comments, editorials, errata**
9. **Short communications, conference contributions, etc.**
